70 years on, we still are not fully awake to the realities of the changing world despite undergoing unearthing surge of political, cultural and social change.

India completes her 70th year as a free nation on 15th August 2017. According to Hindu tradition, the beginning of 70 years is a milestone event in the life of any person. Bhima Ratha Shanti is done as a remedy to overcome the fear of death, loss of memory, relatives etc. It also celebrates the wisdom, maturity, accomplishments and a decade in Vana Prastha since completing Shastiabdapoorthy – a phase of life which marks the renunciation of worldly responsibilities and detachment from power, fame, name and wealth. 70 years in the life of a

Have we graduated from being a fringe, outside ring to a major player in world affairs?

We were a nation of elders when we secured independence from foreign yoke. Today we stand graduated in the reverse direction as a young nation. Every third person in an Indian city is a youth. By 2020, the median individual in India will be 29 years, making it the youngest country in the world. India is about to usher in a dynamic transformation as the population burden of the past turns into a demographic dividend, but the benefits will be tempered by the social and spatial

inequalities unless we as a nation addresses the woes of the youth. The population in the age group of 14-34 is 430 million and expected to rise to 464 million by 2021. By 2020, 64% of India's population would be in the working age group. This demographic potential offers India and its growing economy an unprecedented edge. Today the GDP growth rate is 7%. The Prime Minister is of the opinion that a 8% growth rate for 3 consecutive years will lift India as a developed

nation. The GST is expected to bring about atleast 1% improvement in GDP. This is the most opportune time for India to seize the initiative and convert its youthful population as the engine for change.
